



Parent Corner: Let's Read!

The best thing you can do to teach your child to read is to read to them! This may seem obvious, but it's importance is greater than drilling letters and sounds to teach a child to read. Fluent reading and comprehension comes best from listening to a fluent reader over and over again. And then talking about the book you just read. I recommend that you read to your child for at least 15 minutes every day. Let your child be involved in the reading. Let him/her choose special books for you to read. (Even if they choose the same book every time!) Find a special place to read and make it a habit. If you want to help your child become a successful reader, then spend some time increasing your child's understanding of the books you read. Ask your child questions like these as you study a book:

- "Tell me what has happened so far."
- "What do you think will happen next? Why?"
- "What do you picture in your head?"
- "Are you reminded of another book?"
- "Have you ever felt this way?"
- "Do you have any questions about this story?"
- "What are some important things that have happened?"
- "Is there a lesson we can learn from this book?"

If you spend time talking about what you read, not only will you increase your child's desire to read again, but also increase their ability to dissect a book themselves and get the most understanding possible. It in turn will increase fluency and comprehension.

Here Come the Germs!

Just a note about the changing weather and the sickness it brings. First of all a big thank you to you parents for keeping your children home when they are sick. With the changing weather there always comes more germs along with it. I appreciate you being sensitive to that. This year is predicted to have extra strong flu strains and therefore I thought I better remind you of a few "rules of thumb" that might help you know when to keep your child home. Here they are: if your child has a fever (or had one in the last 24 hours). If your child is continually coughing or sneezing. If your child has a runny nose that you have to wipe more than once an hour. If your child has thrown up or had diarrhea in the past 24 hours. If anyone else in your family has been diagnosed with a contagious sickness. It would be a great help to our class if you will keep your child at home until they have been well for at least 24 hours. As much as I wouldn't want my child to miss school, it's important that they don't cause anyone else to have to miss school too!
